GLOW IN HUMANS

Do you know "HUMANS GLOW IN THE DARK"? Yes, you heard me right, humans do glow in the dark but they emit Infrared light which is 1000 times less intense than visible light and one cannot see those radiations through naked eyes.

These less intensity radiations are known as BIOLUMINESCENCE, and are sometimes produced by living organisms such as Fireflies and Jellyfish. These emissions are results of specialised enzymatic reaction which requires Adenosine Triphosphate (ATP). These reactions are believed to be a by-product of biochemical reactions in which excited molecules are produced from bio-energetic process that involves active oxygen species. It is also believed that energy released as light which is also known as "ULTRAWEAK PHOTON EMISSIONS" is released through the changes in energy metabolism. In 2016, scientists-Kobayashi M. Kikuchi; and Okamura H. from Japan, experimented that if there are diurnal changes of ultraweak photon emission from humans, this was helped by the usage of improved highly sensitive imaging system, a "cryogenic charged-coupled device"(CCD) camera.

Before the use of CCD camera, it took more than 1 hour of acquisition to obtain an image, which was practically impossible for the analysis of physiological relevant bio-photon emission. By the use of CCD camera, it became easier to obtain a clear image in a short period of time.

Since metabolism rates are known to change in a circadian fashion, the scientists investigated the temporal variations of bio-photon emission across the day from healthy human bodies.

The scientists picked 5 men volunteers who were healthy as well as in their 20s, The men were subjected to sleep in a normal dark-light condition from 12am to 7am, while the CCD camera was placed in a light-tight room (in complete darkness). The CCD camera was operated when it was cool (at -120 degree Celsius) with slow scanning mode. The body surface of the men were wiped before the experiment and were subjected to sit in a gloomy room for 15 minutes to adapt dark environment. Then all men's bare chest were placed in front of the camera in the completely dark room for 20 minutes, every 3 hours, from 10am- 10pm, for 3 days. The researchers found something very shocking from this experiment will surprise you

as well. They found out that there were light emissions, highly from the face, and mainly from the cheeks and the forehead. This was shocking because they had checked the temperature of the men, the neck was warm than other parts of the body and the emission was least from the neck. The other amazing thing that the scientists discovered was that the body glow-rose and fell over the days.... The lowest point of glow being at 10am and then a mount to its peak at about 4pm, and then gradually dropping again. The researchers claimed that the glow in the body fluctuated over the course of the day due to the change in the rate of metabolic rhythms.

After some more experiments, the researchers found out that the face glows more than the rest of the body because of the "concentration of melanin" as the face gets more tanned due to more exposure to the sunlight!

The movie illustrates how the pressure of studying engineering forcefully in India had caused harmful effects on students such as depression and the thought of suicide. !!!SPIRITS!!!

Many people think that souls are weightless and after death the souls take oneself to Heaven or Hell. But no, these are false beliefs and are proved scientifically.

The souls in human bodies weigh 21 grams. This was proved in 1901 by Duncan Mac Dougal who is a physician from Haverhill, Massachusetts. He was so determined to find if humans lose weight after death so he pin-pointed six patients at nursing home whose death were forthcoming. Out of these six, four were suffering from Tuberculosis (TB), one from Diabetes, and one from unspecified cause. He chose the patients suffering from different conditions because that would cause the patients to feel physically exhausted and he wanted them to stay still when they die so that he could measure the changes in weight accurately. These patients were placed on beds which were placed on an industrial sized scale that was sensitive within two-tenths of an ounce (5.6 grams). The results which were found after the experiment shocked Mac Dougal as one of the patients lost weight initially but then put the weight back on, and two of the other patients lost weight at death and after a few minutes lost even more weight. And one

of the patients lost three-fourth of an ounce (21.3 grams) in weight. Mac Dougal didn't consider the other patient's result on the basis that the scale were "not finely adjusted". He did the same experiment on fifteen dogs but found out that none of the dogs lost weight.

This experiment was not considered as it had many fluctuations and thus this was experimented again in December 2001 by Lewis E. Hollander Jr., who was a physicist. He performed the same experiment but on a ram, seven ewes (adult sheeps), three lambs and a goat. His experiment showed that seven of the adult sheeps did not lose weight but gained weight about 18-780 grams, which was lost over time again until returning to their initial weight.

Scientists have also claimed that there is "LIFE AFTER DEATH" and the soul, after death remains wandering on Earth during a period of 40 days. In this period of time, the souls come back home, visit places where they lived and even visit their fresh grave. The soul also completes the journey through the aerial toll house finally leaving this World.

This was further told by Dr. Parnia, a UK scientist, that human consciousness does live on

and after we die. He revealed this during Morgan Freeman's Netflix show "the story of God" how he has studied more than 100 cases of cardiac arrest survivors. These were the patients who died but again came back to life. Dr. Parnia also revealed a large percentage of people had bizarre experiences when they died. He once said, "It's important to understand that when a person is dying and they've turned into a cadaver, it's only at that point that the cells inside the body starts to undergo a process of death, which can take hours, if not days. So actually we have this window of time where we can bring people back to life and the experiences that they have given us is an indication of what it is like to go through death". Thus today we call the soul consciousness in science and thus we can test scientifically.

“ Crises often help us sift out things that are important in our lives, both professional and personal, from those that are not. Importance of parental engagement and home schooling and the necessity to make meaningful investment in these areas are among such realizations that this crisis has brought to the fore. ”

Home schooling, an alien concept just a decade back, is now becoming increasingly popular. What is your take on it?

Parental engagement in learners’ education and its long term impact on learners’ cognitive, metacognitive and affective development has attracted much speculation and attention in both public and academic spheres.

There is a growing body of research that increasingly points to the crucial role of parental engagement in learners’ overall development. This is especially true of pre-primary and primary grades where learners’ are in their formative years and are most receptive to the behavioural, social and cultural norms they are exposed to. In fact, research has shown that constructive parental involvement has a positive impact on various indicators of learner achievement which include higher test scores, enhanced engagement in learning activities, better sense of self-esteem and competence, improved behaviour, increased social and improved cultural capital.

Unfortunately, however, it takes years for a new idea to percolate from esoteric research papers to our collective social conscience and reformulate our conception of the process of education. Covid-19 pandemic has ushered in a rare situation that has compelled us to reconsider some of our long held fundamental beliefs and practices in relation to teaching and learning. It has challenged our compartmentalized notion of education which

had until now either underplayed or completely ignored the role of parents in the process of education. Parents’ importance has become more apparent now that we have come to rely on their technical competence, their ability to effectively communicate with their children, their trust in our ability as facilitators and instructors, and their willingness to cooperate and assume the role of active participants in teaching-learning activities. We are, thus, increasingly becoming aware of the need to view parents as our essential collaborators and partners working toward the same goals.

Crises have a way of bringing to the fore the flaws in our understanding of the world and of forcing us to question the validity of our priorities, our actions, methods and the ways we allocate our valuable resources. Covid-19 pandemic made us realize that the activities that learners’ engage in at home under the guidance of parents are just critical to their development as their activities within classrooms and that investing in parental engagement is as important as investing in teacher training and school infrastructure.

As we deploy our resources to find viable solutions to the novel challenges that have emerged from this crisis, we should keep in mind these realizations and a long term view of how these solutions might continue to contribute positively to student outcomes even when we are past the crisis. Parents’ continued engagement must figure into this equation.

“Future is complex and uncertain, therefore, abound in opportunities. Syncretism of creativity, critical thinking and collaborative effort is necessary to realize these opportunities. Herein lies the guiding principle to reformulate modern school education.”

Textbook learning and annual examination determine a child’s progress at the end of the academic year. But can this sort of evaluation ensure my child’s true development at the end of 10 years of schooling?

In a civilized society such as ours, the success of an individual is strongly tied to the relevance of their skills to the challenges faced by society. This axiomatic principle underpins the concept of employment and governs the job market dynamics. Therefore, to assess the true worth of our knowledge and skills, we must first understand the character of modern challenges.

Consider how, over the last ten years, our shopping preferences have shifted from small local family-owned shops to big departmental stores in malls to the convenience of vast online retail stores such as Amazon and Flipkart. Smartphones and social media have redefined how we interact with family, friends, relatives and colleagues. Production of goods such as automobiles, furniture, clothing and even food is being rapidly automated. Algorithms based on Artificial Intelligence (AI) can now compose poems, write stories, trade stocks at speeds greater than humans, and learn to mimic artistic styles of virtuoso painters such as Van Gogh and Johannes Vermeer in just six hours. Our society is thus undergoing tremendous transformation at a rate unprecedented in the history of mankind.

A striking consequence of these advances is the rate at which knowledge and skills that were once considered useful and



employable are being rendered obsolete. Juxtapose this realization with conventional school curricula that have mostly remained, in relative terms, stagnant for over a decade and we begin to see the reason for growing anxiety among students and parents. Almost all modern challenges are essentially interdisciplinary in nature and, therefore, demand a more inclusive and holistic approach to education. In contrast, conventional school curricula offer subjects that rarely venture beyond the bounds of traditional disciplines, thus circumscribing their utility in the face of real-life challenges. Annual examinations continue to assess students on few narrowly defined metrics that fail to accommodate key skills (such as critical thinking, problem-solving, creativity and empathy) which cannot be automated and prove indispensable in today’s increasingly complex world.

Therefore, our approach to school education needs revision. To this end, we first need to accept the practical utility of vast knowledge and wide range of skills that have remained outside the bounds of formal school education. We must design training programs for our students that integrate a kaleidoscopic range of topics and practical skills commensurate with the characteristics of challenges they are likely to face in the future. It is high time that we, parents and teachers, acknowledge the increasing demands of modern education and join forces to ensure that our students are equipped with the best tools needed to thrive in an unpredictable world.
